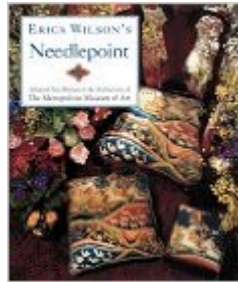


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# Erica Wilson's Needlepoint: Adapted From Objects In The Collections At The Metropolitan Museum Of Art

I just adore Erica Wilson. She died recently and is sadly missed in the stitching world. The projects in this book have the gravity of being based on famous museum pieces and are also beautiful in their own right. I love the medieval pieces as well as the blue-and-white Chinese patterns. I disagree with the reviewer who gave only 3 stars--I find the conversion charts in the back of the book with E.W. Persian, apparently what the author used, Paternayan, DMC, and Anchor to be very clear. Even if the colors aren't perfect, since these are not exact museum replicas, you should feel free to make it your own anyway. And I display one of the graphs: first, they're huge; second, the grids are shown with symbols and colors both. So you can get a feel if your colors are off. Or if you merely want to change them. The discussion of the how-to's in the back of the book are also good.
