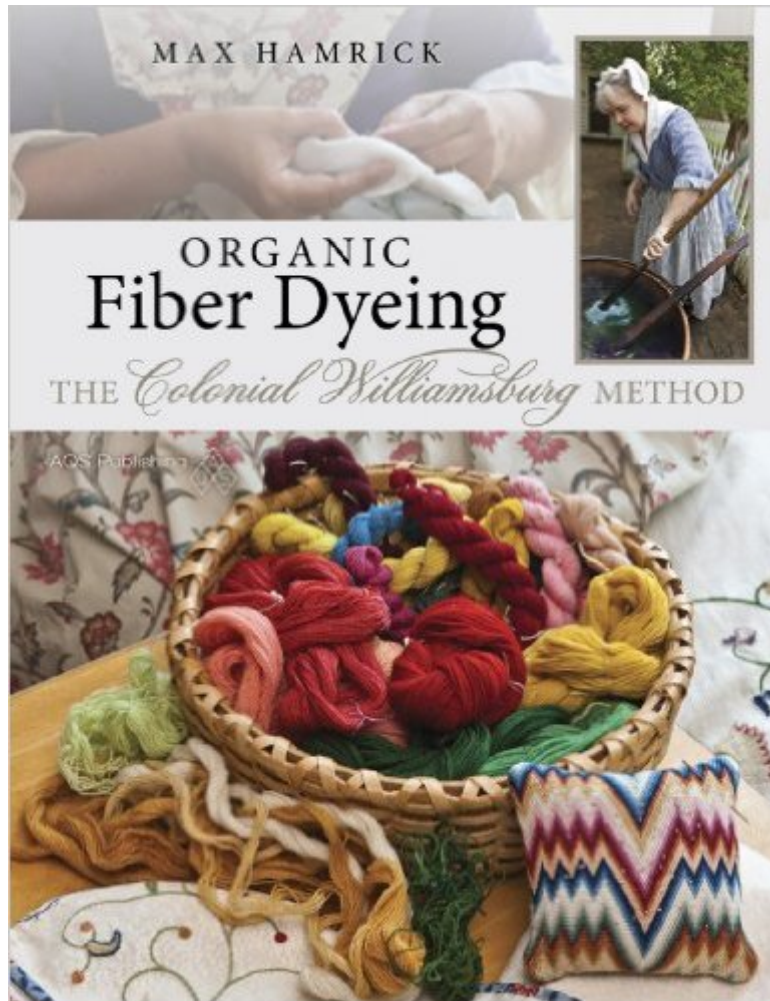

Of particular interest to me were the comments on historically used mordants, many of which are toxic. The methods in the book use alum, the least offensive of the traditional mordants. Great addition to my dye library.
